

Letter from the Executive Director



Dear Patrons, Board Members, and Friends of NEPACMS,

Thank you for your support for the Northeastern Pennsylvania Chamber Music Society and our mission to foster the growth of chamber music in the Northeastern Pennsylvania region. The 2022 season was particularly productive for the Northeastern Pennsylvania Chamber Music Society. We took center stage in several community events including the Fine Arts Fiesta, Pittston Art Walk, and Arts at Hayfield's Summer Arts Festival, presented several acclaimed guest artists from around the country, and expanded our reach by playing in new venues across our region.

In January we kicked off the new year with a series of concerts featuring Belgian-American pianist Steven Vanhauwaert and University of Arizona professor, and good friend to NEPACMS, Theodore Buchholz. Joined by NEPACMS's co-founder Amy Iwazumi and myself, we presented concerts at our home base, St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Wilkes-Barre, and the Cathedral

Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, PA. It was a vibrant program featuring chamber music by contemporary American composers Kenji Bunch, Paul Schoenfield, and Jessie Montgomery, as well as a piano trio by a young Antonín Dvořák. We had the opportunity to take some of this music to area students, giving a mini-performance and talk. They loved it; great music sells itself!

Our March concert featured the Trio Cabrini, comprised of pianist and accordionist, Vlada Yaneva; clarinetist, Nuno Antunes; and bassoonist/singer, Gina Cuffari. They are a unique ensemble and delighted our audience with a wide variety of musical selections, including a piece where the immensely talented Gina Cuffari had to sing and play the bassoon!

May brought our 2021/2022 season to a close with featured guest bassist and Eastman School of Music professor, James VanDemark. This concert was particularly special for me as I had the privilege of teaming up with a former professor of mine for the first time since 2007. In addition to being a world-renowned bassist and pedagogue, VanDemark is also a seasoned narrator. We began the program with Ferdinand the Bull for speaker and violin, by Alan Ridout, who set the popular satirical children's story to music. Closing out the season was the ever popular "Trout" quintet by Franz Schubert. Joining James, Amy, and myself was Inca-American pianist and composer Hwaen Ch'uqi, and Rochester based cellist and Eastman School of Music professor, Lisa Caravan.

Beginning the 2022/2023 season, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Chamber Music Society teamed up with members of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the First Presbyterian Church in downtown Wilkes-Barre. "First Pres", as it is affectionately known as, is a particularly special place for NEPACMS, as it is where we held our first concert back in 2015. At this celebratory event in October of 2022, NEPACMS was featured in two pieces, the Bach Brandenburg Concerto No. 3 and Mendelssohn's riveting Octet for Strings.

Joining us in November, coming all the way from Los Angeles, we brought back past guest, renowned oboist and recording artist, Rong-Huey Liu. We had the opportunity to perform in a beautiful new venue, St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Montrose, PA. It was a wonderful opportunity to bring our love of chamber music to new audiences. We hope to return in the future!

In collaboration with Music from St. Stephen's, in December I had the pleasure of presenting a free recital with the local and highly talented pianist, Brian Farrell. As part of the church's celebration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of César Franck we celebrated by performing Belgian music by Franck's good friend, the composer and violinist Eugène Ysaÿe, the sonata by his talented student Guillaume Lekeu, and of course the riveting Violin Sonata by Franck himself.

Thank you all for your sustained support of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Chamber Music Society. We look forward to continuing to bring world-class chamber music and educational programs to Northeastern Pennsylvania in the seasons ahead.
